

DIRECTOR'S NOTE

AT THE START OF EVERY NEW PROJECT, I ask myself (and my creative team) three key questions. Why are we doing this play? What is this play about? What do we want the audience to walk away with after seeing this production? Here are my answers to those questions.

- 1. In selecting plays for our production season, we (the Theatre Department faculty) endeavor to expose our theatre students to a wide range of titles, reflecting a variety of styles and artistic challenges. From musical theater repertoire, to family-friendly holiday productions, to the classics, to original scripts, we are constantly seeking to give our students a well-rounded practical education in the theatre. The Real Inspector Hound serves this mission in several ways. It exposes students to a play that draws on multiple styles and genres, offers some wonderful character acting opportunities, and lets students explore the specific challenges of acting with a dialect. On top of that, our students are introduced to the work of the great British playwright Tom Stoppard, whose work has been challenging and shaping the professional theater for over half a century.
- 2. According to interviews with Mr. Stoppard, the one thing the play is not about is theatre critics (though Stoppard did work as a theatre critic himself early in his career). After exploring this show over the past month, we have concluded that the play is about the dangers of wish-fulfillment. Our critics, Moon and Birdboot, are both consumed with their individual longings but in getting what they want, they lose it all. A cautionary tale of getting what you want, albeit a very funny caution.
- 3. The winner of multiple Academy and Tony Awards, Tom Stoppard is a prolific play-wright with an impressive body of work, including Rosencrantz and Guildenstern are Dead, Arcadia, Shakespeare in Love, and The Coast of Utopia. It is my sincere hope that after seeing this charming little play, our audiences are excited to explore more of Mr. Stoppard's wit and wordplay.

Thank you for supporting the arts at Monmouth College. Enjoy the show.

By entering this production, our theater department is sharing in the KCACTF goals to recognize, reward, and celebrate the exemplary work produced in college and university theaters across the nation.
